HON. DUFF ROBLIN (Premier)(Wolseley): Madam Speaker, if I may have the leave of the House, I would like to say a word about our proceedings before you begin the routine business. I think it would be the wish of the members that the House should adjourn at this stage so that we may continue our work in the Law Amendments Committee, in the expectation that we would be there the whole of the afternoon. If by an chance we should finish the work of that committee in good time so as to make it profitable to return to the Chamber, then I think that we would like to do so if we had consent to do that. I don't regard that as likely however.

Respecting this evening's proceedings, unless the Law Amendments Committee sits overtime, in which case this will not apply, but if it rises at or about the usual time I have been asked by the Whips if the House could meet at 7:30 instead of 8:00 and adjourn at 10 o'clock so that a certain function that is in mind may be carried out. So the arrangement then would be that we would go to committee now and, as far as I can see, stay there for the rest of the afternoon in the hope of disposing of the bills that are before the committee. If we got rid of them at or about the usual time of rising, then the House would reconvene at 7:30 tonight and plan on adjourning at 10. I trust those arrangements will prove satisfactory. So I move, Madam Speaker, seconded by the Honourable Minister of Industry and Commerce, that the House do now adjourn.

Madam Speaker presented the motion.

MR. ROBLIN: Until 7:30 tonight, Madam. I guess we'll have to make that firm under the circumstances.
